2.1. Refugee Support and Humanitarian Actions

2.1.1. Aid Relief during Covid-19 Period



During this period of lockdown due to Covid-19 Pandemic, HEM provided aid relief to 27 families with food problems in Kampala, Wakiso, Kyaka II and Nakivale. The aid relief provided in May 2020 focused on families with total orphans, elderly and people with disability.



The above photo shows the progression of a widow's rehabilitated house from April to May in Nakivale Refugee Settlement.

2.1.3. Assistance to Less than five years total Orphans



In May 2020, 24 less than five years total orphans were cared for in Kyaka II Refugee Settlement and 20 in Nakivale Refugee Settlement. The assistance focused on nutritious food such as: Milk, and Porridge. Also, small fish; soaps; advocacy for medical services were provided.





2.2. Community Development Initiatives

2.2.1. Financial inclusion through SACCOs








In this month of May 2020, HEM staff continued to sensitize people on measures to mitigate Covid-19, and the saving culture to be able to invest and access loans. The sensitization helped to increase SACCOs members with 17 new accounts opened in May 2020 and 6 members got loans. The total savings were 180 and total withdrawals were 119. Six loans were recovered totally.

2.3. Church Leadership Empowerment

In this month of May 2020, the activities of Church Leadership Empowerment were seriously affected by lockdown due to Covid-19 pandemic. However, new strategies were adopted to continue trainings in Bible and Counselling. Online Bible teachings, preaching and professional counselling course using Mobile Phone (Whatsup) were prepared and provided. This counselling training intends to give to pastors and church leaders professional skills in counselling who in turn have to deal with serious problems facing individuals and families especially those caused by Covid-19.



The picture above is the sample of the 1st lecture of Professional Counseling Course delivered in Kinyarwanda but we also English and French versions.

2.4. Evangelism and Church Planting

As usual, during this period of lockdown, Christians were encouraged to intensify prayers and do Sunday services at homes. Some church houses are on rehabilitation process according to their limited means.

4. Challenges

As it is known, Covid-19 continues to be a big challenge to the world especially to vulnerable people like refugees. The period of staying home without working becomes so long that many refugees come to HEM office for support. Unfortunately, HEM could not respond to their needs due to limited funds. It is reminded that the quantity of food distributed to refugees reduced from 31,000Uanda shillings per person per month to 22,000UGH while prices on the markets are high. This cannot help a refugee to survive. In addition, the challenge of moving around the settlements due to lack of means of transport such as motorcycles and cars was also encountered by HEM staff.

5. Conclusion

The management of HEM is proud of its realisations in May 2020 when life was hard to a big number of people. As we are committed to support our fellow refugees, we shall continue to use the little funds we have and we call upon OPM and UNHCR to make a special advocacy for refugees in this challenging situation of Covid-19. Also, we call upon stakeholders, donors and partners to intervene to assist refugees who live of 0.17USD per day per person and to support HEM so that it may meet its goals of assisting vulnerable people especially refugees. Finally, it is a great opportunity to thank God for protecting us. Many thanks are addressed to our partners and donors for their support.
